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

Did you know?

- PNG is about the size of California but has only half the population of Los Angeles.
- PNG has the language with the smallest alphabet– Rotokas has only 7 letters.
- PNG has over 800 local languages but the official language is English.
- There is no road connecting the capital city, Port Moresby, with any other major city in the country, travel is only by air, boat or foot.

The literacy rate in PNG has been estimated between 15-55%. This number is difficult to accurately assess nationwide because most of the country lives in rural areas and there is a large discrepancy in the literacy rate between the urban and rural populations. The STEP course (**S**trengthening **T**okples **E**ducation in **P**apua **N**ew **G**uinea) exists because, whether the literacy rate is 15% or 55%, literacy is still a huge need in PNG. STEP trains Papua New Guinean nationals to train other teachers, manage literacy classes and expand community based vernacular literacy programs. Since 1994, 212 men and women from 19 provinces and 122 languages have graduated from STEP.

This current course has 19 participants from 5 different provinces and 10 different languages. Betty works in Madang, promoting vernacular literacy in areas where Tok Pisin and English are being spoken at the expense of the vernacular.

PNG Flag Fact

The PNG flag was designed by a 15 year-old schoolgirl. In 1971, there was a nation-wide flag design contest. The Onobasulu translators, who were in grade school at the time, remember drawing their own designs for this contest.



Liz and I were out in Walagu on September 16th when Papua New Guinea celebrated 34 years of independence. We spent the day painting faces and (bellies!) with the PNG flag and sharing the Wordless Book. The Wordless Book uses the familiar colors from the PNG flag to help people learn about and remember the message of the gospel.

Nigiligagalu – Darkness/Sin

Yesune ibi– Jesus’ blood

Galagololu– Cleansed and Pure

Miliyolu miliyo– Eternal Life

We gave out black, red, white and yellow balloons as well as temporary PNG flag tattoos if people could remember the spiritual significance of each color.
